Greetings readers on this bright and sunny morning,

First a big 'Thank You!' to all who organised, prepared and delivered the recent Craft Fair at Woolsthorpe and all our supporters who attended. It was an excellent event full of interest and enjoyed by all but particularly the stall-holders who attended and asked us to organise another event that they can attend!

The wet weather has passed - or has it? - and if you haven't seen the impact our growing number of maintenance teams have had on the canal - you need a trip on Three Shires. They have been hard at work removing fallen timber, clearing canal banks of self-set trees, removing mud flushed out from fielddrains and a range of other less obvious tasks all of which I hope add to your enjoyment of the canal. Three Shires is already busy with bookings thanks to all the crews for their commitment.

Our construction teams are not readily visible to towpath travellers as the restoration of Lock 13 continues behind safety fencing and other activity to maintain water levels continues at sites along the waterway as far as the River Trent.

We have new volunteers joining our teams and I thank them for their commitment to the Society and their contribution in different ways to the restoration of the canal.

Perhaps some more new faces could come forward as we need all the help we can get with 30 miles of waterway to look after!

I have not forgotten the volunteer effort that has been required to formally identify a way of re-connecting the canal to the river. That continues to produce the necessary surveys and strategies required to meet current regulations and has received initial support from both Nottinghamshire County Council and Rushcliffe Borough Council. We thank both councils for their support and encouragement.

I will once again make a plea for some technical help as we need a person with IT skills and flair to develop our communication and media output. In this field the requirements are well beyond the experience of our senior volunteers and offer a real opportunity for youth to shine. Perhaps mention the opportunity to your grand-children? Please!

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Following a short stint recently as a crew member on my friends' narrowboat, churning through the flotsam & jetsam swirling around (usually just beneath the surface or at least partially submerged!) the Trent & Mersey, Coventry and Oxford canals, it occurred to me that the general state of the canal system is guickly reaching a critical stage of degradation and detieroration.

General maintenance of the infrastucture appears to be mostly reactive with many locks leaking badly and gate paddles either broken or inoperative, only being rectfied after reports to CRT. Navigation stoppages are posted daily at an alarming rate. Of course, most of these are 'nature-induced' such as fallen tress, not enough or too much water, etc. But many stoppages are due to a lack of foresight and planned maintenance. Earlier in the year we were stuck in the centre of Manchester due to a broken lock mechanism and CRT couldn't get at it without jumping through a huge amount of beaurocratic red tape nonsense, such as temporary closure of a bus stop so that a crane could park near a bridge!

To be fair to the organisation they are on a hiding to nothing especially since Government funding is actively being reduced and reliance on volunteers to carry out much of the day-to-day work can only mean a huge struggle to 'stay afloat' operationally.

Our canal, on the other hand, must be one of the best maintained canal on the system, if the magnificent work carried out by our workparty volunteers is anything to go by.

WORKPARTY & CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

General Manager Tony Osbond

It's Wednesday 22nd May as I write this ... just a month away from Mid-Summer and we have another day of rain!!

After a very wet and windy spring (nearly lost the marquee before our April Craft Day) the weather of late has been very kind with a hint that Summer is here.

Operationally all of our teams have been busy both on the water maintaining navigation on the summit pound for *Three Shires* our trip boat and on land building our stock of logs for the coming winter period as well as localised maintenance on our machinery.

Otter, our weed boat, is now back in the water having gone through a major maintenance schedule and is busy on the summit pound clearing the incessant weed that is prolific at this time of year. *Mudlark* went through a series of major repairs and servicing in late winter and has joined Otter on the Summit pound clearing localised build-up of silt.

We are looking to increase the mechanisation of our dredging and silt removal activities. We need better equipment and have been visiting restoration societies such as The Cotswold Canal Society to understand the solutions they have come up with. Visits also to contractors such as Land and Water that carry out this work have been undertaken and the team now have a better understanding of what is needed.

This will be a costly exercise but the summit pound needs machinery to carry out the work so we are busy with bids going in for funding to help with this expense.

Tree clearance from the canal is an ongoing exercise where in recent times through heavy winds trees have fallen into the canal. Locations at Harby, Kinoulton and Lady Bay have been cleared and where possible logs have been brought back to the Depot to be put through our logging splitter and stored for drying out.





Workparty & Construction continued

Developing relationships with local companies is very important to GCS and as such we hosted a company from Grantham called Genie.

Eight of their staff joined our Friday Maintenance Team in March and spent a day clearing vegetation up at Harlaxton and also assisted in crewing our maintenance boat *Centauri*. A successful day enjoyed by Genie and our volunteers who supervised their work,

Construction work on Lock 13 is moving on well with the two dams now in place at the top and bottom of the Lock chamber. The temporary by wash is in place and commissioned which has now allowed the canal water between the top dam and the top weir to be drained. This was successfully carried out with the help of Bottesford Angling who helped with rescuing the fish as the canal area was pumped out.

Temporary propping of the lock walls is now in the design stage. Before we start dewatering the lock chamber the construction crew are involved with reducing the ground levels around the lock chamber to assist with the measures we need to implement with the propping solution.

Workparty & Construction continued

The work to Lock 18 paddle gear replacement is in abeyance waiting for CRT to come back on the replacement paddles for the top letter boxes. We are looking to produce the paddles ourselves and have approached a local manufacturer for a price. A decision from CRT is awaited on the supply of replacement balance beams to the bottom gates on Lock 18. Supporting timber work is in stock for the paddle gear.

We still have a problem with water leaking into the adjacent field towpath side despite the repointing we completed. The leak is emanating from the towpath side letterbox by the top gate. CRT are looking into the use of a resin-based solution that was employed successfully on Culvert 13 a few years ago as a solution to the problem.

Work to the repairs of Culvert 12 is in abeyance. CRT have still to complete the designs and we have a meeting in early June to see how this is progressing. Meetings with Belvoir Estates have been carried out with a tentative start date after harvest (late July) on the project.

WeBCan – the Lady Bay action group – still continue to make progress on reed clearance in the Lady Bay/Gamston area making a considerable difference to the aspect of a canal in water.





The Trent Connection project continues apace with meetings with local authorities together with meetings with the developers of the Tollerton Lane housing development.

We now have a letter of support from Rushcliffe Borough Council for the scheme; it will now go forward to be included in the Rushcliffe Plan due to be updated in 2027. Further meetings with Notts County Council are continuing to support the conclusions of the feasibility study working towards the authority protecting the route from further development.

We are delighted to say that we are arranging a special treat for all our members – afternoon tea on the celebrated Great Central Railway, to take place on 20 June.

Participants will have the opportunity to spend the whole day on the railway, provided they arrange to get to Loughborough in time to board the 2pm Afternoon Tea service, for which we have booked a whole carriage. Trains usually start running at 10am from Loughborough. A full timetable will be available nearer the date, but it would seem that 4 full round trips might be possible for the enthusiasts!

This looks like being a fantastic day out, those who know the Great Central railway will be aware that as the UK's only double track, main line heritage railway, this is the only place in the world where full size steam engines can be seen passing each other.

A VISIT TO THE NATIONAL WATERWAYS MUSEUM

The rain was persisting down on a cold March morning as myself and Angela drove from Manchester to the National Waterways Museum at Ellesmere Port. I have never known a place like Manchester – it seems to rain continuously [having lived there, I can testify to John's perception! Ed]. I can see where it gets its reputation from!

I joined The Grantham Canal Society last November and along with volunteering I find myself going down a particular rabbit hole delving into the historical aspects of canals – hence, I was looking forward to our visit to the Museum.



Ellesmere Port was an important Dock back in the day, situated by the Manchester Ship Canal and the Shropshire Union Canal. The dock is now the site of the museum where many of the old buildings remain.

The museum was easy to find – it's just off the M53 and well signposted. It was interesting to see the chimneys billowing steam as we passed numerous chemical plants adjacent to Manchester Ship canal.

The rain blew us into reception where we were given some bad news – the main exhibition hall was closed because there had been a theft of several artefacts and CRT were reviewing their security arrangements. I hadn't anticipated that there was a market for such artefacts - it's such a shame that this happened. This exhibition hall houses most of the museum's collection so we will have to visit another time to see these. The good news is that we can visit again using the tickets bought today.



We needed a hot cup of coffee to warm us up and peruse the site map we had been given in reception. The café is situated next to reception and looks out over an expanse of water. Angela spotted some Welsh cakes so we had a couple – well, it would be rude not to!

Venturing outside with umbrellas aloft, and following the recommended route around the site, we first encountered a horse statue which was a nice nod to the days before boats were powered by engines.

And speaking of engines, we ventured into the Power Hall which houses early steam and diesel engines. It was good to have a chat with the happy volunteers working there and good to see DofE students joining them learning new skills. It was also a nice place to visit because it was warm!

Continuing on we visited the old slipway, the old messroom and superintendents' office, the blacksmiths forge, and the stables. I loved seeing the old buildings. I smiled when I saw the messroom – the teapot on the table reminded me of the messroom at Woolsthorpe depot.
